DIVERSITY SPOTLIGHT

ECE Assistant Professor and DEI committee member Irving Barron was selected as a Fellow for the <u>iREDEFINE</u> <u>Workshop</u> held in Tuscon, AZ last March. iREDEFINE, or Impact: Redefining Electrical and Computer Engineering



Faculty, is an NSF-sponsored workshop designed to increase the number of women and underrepresented minorities among the faculty in ECE departments. iREDEFINE is held in parallel with the annual meeting of the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department Heads Association (ECEDHA) Annual Conference & ECExpo. Selected Fellows have dedicated programming designed to encourage and facilitate their path into academia. The close ties with ECEDHA provide a unique opportunity for the iREDEFINE Fellows to also attend general ECEDHA sessions, present their research to department chairs, and participate in mock interviews. Irving highly recommends this conference to ECE graduate students, stating that "the most valuable part was gaining insights into how other iREDEFINE fellows navigate their graduate studies. I learned about their challenges, struggles, and the strategies they used to overcome obstacles and succeed as ECE students. The workshop also provides valuable insights into careers in academia, including both tenure-track and instructional-track positions. If you are curious about what a future in academia might look like and how to begin that journey, the iREDEFINE Workshop is an excellent opportunity." Next year's workshop will take place March 22-23, 2025 in Norfolk, VA. iREDEFINE Fellows receive a professional

development grant (up to \$2000) to cover attendance expenses. Please click on the image to the right to learn more!







GHC is a series of conferences designed to bring the research and career interests of women in computing to the forefront. It is the world's largest gathering of women and non-binary technologists. The tech conference, named after computer scientist Grace Hopper, is organized by the Anita Borg Institute for Women and Technology. Aakanksha had this to say about her participation: "GHC 2024 was a pivotal experience for my professional growth, allowing me to reconnect with Rewriting the Code, meet a mentor, and secure interviews with three companies.
