


most pressing issues. Nyasha will spend May through August in Gwanda, Zimbabwe for a project titled "Sewing Peace" at a local high school that she attended. Nyasha shared some thoughts with us. How did you come to apply for this fellowship? "I was inspired by Kapabwe Chalwe '20, he is a previous recipient of the grant and an ECE graduate. He told me about how they set up a greenhouse in Tanzania to help previously abused girls living at a shelter earn an income. I was inspired, and I knew my community could really use this grant. I had just gone home, and I saw the severe land degradation and heard concerns about the increasing number of

high school dropouts going for gold panning." What does it mean to you to be able to spend the summer on such a meaningful service project? "It is exciting. Community service is at the heart of everything I do, and this time I get to do it in my own hometown! I am excited about the long-term impact of this project in rebuilding my community; in encouraging youths to earn a living through sustainable means and in restoring environment that has suffered from the effects of these illegal mining activities" Thanks so much, Nyasha!
